"Teaching a Web of Arkansas History," is open to museum, library, and archive professionals, as well as secondary education teachers in Arkansas. Participants will receive step-by-step instructions from a professional archivist on creating a web-based exhibit using historical images.

This **all-day** workshop will be offered three times in **2016**. Lunch will be provided. Participants will receive hands-on training by creating a mock web exhibit, learn professional standards for caring for and digitizing photographs, and discover how to use Omeka, a free web-publishing platform. The workshop will also teach how to write descriptions for digitized materials to optimize their findability on the Internet.
