


Our commitment to building industry and community partnerships is stronger than ever with dozens of new partners joining us to sponsor classroom upgrades, provide industry internships, and build new career pathways at UA Little Rock.

## **About UA Little Rock Students**

At UA Little Rock, our campus community has worked hard to overcome over a decade of enrollment declines. For the first time in more than a decade, UA Little Rock is seeing positive enrollment gains. This year we experienced an increase in undergraduate and graduate student full-time equivalents (FTE) of 1.2% and an increase in student semester credit hours (SSCH) of 1.0%.

At UA Little Rock, the student community has a multitude of diverse lived experiences. With nontraditional, transfer, firstgeneration, military, working, parenting, and independent students all converging, classrooms become a mosaic of perspectives. This blend generates a dynamic learning environment, where the exchange of unique viewpoints fosters creativity, empathy, and a deeper understanding of the world.

As students from all walks of life come together, they create a unique space for holistic learning that extends beyond textbooks, preparing them for the complexities of a diverse and interconnected global society.

They support industry leaders in enhancing the knowledge and skills of their workforce, while simultaneously driving growth in the workforce in Arkansas.

## **Providing Access Through Affordability**

At UA Little Rock, our core mission is to provide an affordable education for students, helping benefit the state and our region. One way we're accomplishing this is through removing barriers that many students face.

"It is an institutional priority for UA Little Rock to help students obtain their degree with little to no debt at graduation," said Dr. Cody Decker, vice chancellor for student affairs and chief data officer.

We've developed a comprehensive scholarship initiative supporting access to institutional, state, and federal funding, without asking students to take on student loans. Here are ways we are making sure college is affordable and accessible for students:

- Trojan Guarantee Starting in Fall 2024, this will guarantee that if a student is Pell-eligible and gets the Academic Challenge Scholarship, they can earn a zerotuition bachelor's degree.
- 1/2 Off Scholarship This provides entering freshmen students with a half-off tuition scholarship for the first two years at UA Little Rock.
- Arkansas Academic Challenge Scholarship This scholarship is for Arkansas residents and is funded by the Arkansas Scholarship Lottery. It is available to students regardless of their financial status.

 Need-based Scholarships - UA Little Rock has multiple need-based scholarships that support students with significant financial need

- UA Pulaski Tech Scholarship Matching Students transferring from UA-PTC receive a tuition matching scholarship, allowing them to continue their education at the same rate they paid at UA-PTC.
- Scholarship Universe This is our no cost scholarshipmatching tool that matches students with private university scholarships and national scholarships.
- Corporate Partnerships UA Little Rock has developed a corporate partnership program with more than 22 industry partners that provides a discounted tuition rate for partner employees.
- Trojan Works UA Little Rock has developed a campus work program helping students gain valuable experience. This program does not require federal work study eligibility.
- Minority Outreach UA Little Rock supports the Hispanic community by being a LULAC Destination Campus, providing a Spanish-speaking recruiter, and offering admissions materials in Spanish, helping ensure a welcoming and inclusive environment for potential students.
- "Get Your Feet Wet" Scholarship This scholarship supports graduate students beginning their academic journey by covering the tuition for one course, helping them ease into graduate school and gain confidence.




As a result of focusing on affordability, UA Little Rock has continued reducing the net price students pay and is now the third least expensive four-year public university in the state.

For many students, combining the offerings helps significantly reduce the price. For example, when combining the half-off scholarship and the Arkansas Challenge Scholarship, a student can earn a four-year degree for \$14,000 total. That's the baseline. However, when factoring in additional scholarships, Pell Grants, and other funding sources – the cost is much less.

# Embracing Technology to Help Students Prepare

In order for students to succeed in today's ever-changing workforce, embracing technology is critical. In the classroom, students need access to the latest tools and technology to prepare for their career.

Here are just a few of the latest technologies available for UA Little Rock students to use in their studies:

- Clean Research Room: This is a specialized room that removes pollutants like dust and airborne microbes. It helps students conduct research and be assured their research is not impacted by airborne contaminants.
- CAVE (Cave Automatic Virtual Environment): This space connects giant 3D screens for a lifesize virtual reality experience. It helps cybersecurity students develop full-scale prototypes of buildings and places to mitigate issues prior to development.
- Simulation Labs: Available for multiple programs, these spaces allow students to practice their skills in a safe environment helping them improve through immediate, real-time feedback.

Access to much of the latest technology is made possible because of industry partnerships and helps ensure UA Little Rock students learn on the latest technology, so they're prepared when they step into their industry internship or career.

"We are grateful to our industry partners in the construction industry," said Dr. Lawrence Whitman, dean of the Donaghey College of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics. "The relationships we've built help our students. When they learn on similar equipment, we're preparing them to be better employees because they're already familiar with the technology in the field. It's a true symbiotic relationship."

In addition to facility upgrades, industry partnerships also support academic excellence through curriculum enhancements. Through collaboration with industry partners, UA Little Rock remains closely attune to industry trends, cutting-edge technologies, and evolving practices. This alignment ensures that our students receive an education that mirrors the current demands of the workforce, enhancing their employability upon graduation.

Embracing technology is more than an instructional strategy; it fosters collaborative endeavors that bring unique groups together to learn from one another.

For example, the Crimescene 360 Virtual Reality application developed at UA Little Rock emerged from a partnership between the Emerging Analytics Center and the School of Criminal Justice and Criminology. The EAC students utilized





their skills to develop and build the app, while students in the criminal justice program use the app as an applied learning tool.

"Being able to utilize the app helped our students to hone their crime scene skills," said Dr. Tusty ten Bensel, associate dean, College of Business, Health, and Human Services. "We are looking to expand our use of technology in the classroom. With major advances in virtual reality and artificial intelligence, there are many more options to utilize such tools to provide active learning experiences for our students."

These are just a few examples of UA Little Rock's continued commitment to ensuring students are prepared for their career. By integrating technology into the learning process, students at UA Little Rock are poised to shape a world that embraces the power of knowledge and the importance of collaboration.

## **Enhancing the Living and Learning Environment**

The University of Arkansas at Little Rock is investing in a significant upgrade that will change the university for decades to come.

Thanks to a generous \$8+ million dollar grant from the Donaghey Foundation and other private donors, the university is redefining its north to south campus promenade. The Trojan Way, as the project is called, will be completed in 2024-25 and will result in a major upgrade to the campus living and learning environment.

Living and learning environments are spaces specifically designed to help the university community build connections, gather for special events, and regularly network with one another.

Some of the planned upgrades for the Trojan Way that will foster such connections include:

- Enhanced walkways with landscaping and lighting
- Outdoor learning environments
- Stage for hosting campus events
- Seating wall with built-in charging stations

More than just reimagining the campus promenade, living and learning environments play a key role in student success.

"Helping students succeed drives everything we do at UA Little Rock, and this project is no different," said Chancellor Christina S. Drale. "By providing these gathering spaces, we are creating community on our campus and giving students the opportunity to learn not only from their faculty but from one another. We know that developing these places will help build a strong connection to our campus and help students succeed, which will pay dividends for years to come for our university and our state."

# **Students Learn Through Competitions**

Students in the University of Arkansas at Little Rock real estate program won a national real estate challenge this spring in Chicago.

Academic competitions provide a valuable platform for students to put their classroom learning into practice, allowing them to refine their research and writing skills while gaining hands-on experience in real-world scenarios.

In the real estate challenge, the dozen university teams were asked to develop and present a proposal for a redevelopment project of a high-profile area of real estate in Chicago.

The UA Little Rock students proposed a comprehensive development plan to revitalize the area and create a community hub complete with retail, restaurants, office buildings, and a learning center.

"This competition highlighted the creativity of our students," said Elizabeth Small, director of business networks and instructor of real estate development. "The students applied what we've been covering in our courses to creatively solve this challenge. It's my hope this project and presentation experience will help them better understand the many facets of a career in real estate."

The project is one example of the practical nature of many courses at UA Little Rock helping support the learning students receive in the classroom. By taking part in competitions, students gain valuable experience and expertise that goes beyond what's covered in textbooks.







# Transforming Teacher Education in Arkansas

The need for quality teachers will pay dividends for decades, helping educate students who then positively impact our community. It's in that spirit that UA Little Rock is transforming teacher education in Arkansas.

By providing students with paid residencies, the ability to learn with expert national partners, and the opportunity to collaborate with a local school district, UA Little Rock is embarking on a comprehensive program to recruit, train, and retain K-12 teachers in Arkansas.

"Our intention is to become the No. 1 provider of day one ready teachers in the state," said Dr. Sarah Beth Estes, dean of the College of Humanities, Arts, Social Sciences, and Education. "After their year-long residencies, our teacher candidates will be exceptionally prepared to take the helm of their own classrooms."

That bold vision is driving the work: work that is now happening thanks to partners Forward Arkansas, the Windgate Foundation, the Little Rock School District, and the Jacksonville North Pulaski School District.

Forward Arkansas will provide more than \$1.6 million over the next three years through direct funding and access to technical assistance. Those funds will help provide paid residencies for teachers and provide access to national experts in teaching training.

Windgate joined the effort in May announcing a \$3.5 million grant to endow the directorship of the School of Education. The new Windgate Director will focus on strengthening partnerships with K-12 schools and state school districts, supporting curricular innovation, and raising funds to support teacher preparation efforts.

The Little Rock School District and the Jacksonville North Pulaski School District are serving as hosts of the teacher residency program and are providing feedback to help support continuous improvement in teacher education and training. Together, UA Little Rock and its partners are working collaboratively to ensure that Arkansas has a pipeline of professionally trained teachers ready to prepare the next generation of students in our state.

# **Researching Student Success in STEM with Landmark Grant**

The University of Arkansas at Little Rock is helping support STEM education as part of a prestigious nearly \$2 million grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF). The grant will help revolutionize teaching and learning in undergraduate STEM education, and it's the largest grant UA Little Rock has ever received from the NSF.

Spanning five years, it will provide comprehensive support for faculty and students in the Donaghey College of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics, with a specific focus on increasing engagement and retention rates among underrepresented student populations.

The grant and corresponding research study will identify and develop strategies to combat barriers to success in lecture-based STEM courses, particularly for historically underserved populations, first-generation students, and Pell Grant recipients.

"By fostering classroom environments that offer equal opportunities for engagement, we can empower every student to reach their full potential and thrive in their educational journey," said Dr. Mark Baillie, assistant professor of chemistry and grant team member.

As part of the study, UA Little Rock will enhance its already successful Mobile Institute on Scientific Teaching (MoSI) and the Learning Assistant Programs to be more widespread throughout the STEM disciplines, will offer additional incentives for those taking part, and provide feedback to support faculty in enhancing student-centered teaching practices.

These initiatives, exclusive to UA Little Rock among higher education institutions in Arkansas, have already demonstrated remarkable success in faculty and student achievement.

By studying the long-term effects of the additional student support, the team hopes to better understand how students learn STEM content and apply the findings to other courses at UA Little Rock and to STEM education across the country.

# **Supporting Students is Critical for Their Success**

At UA Little Rock, we know that affording college is only half the equation. Many students need additional help to achieve their goals. By working to remove barriers, UA Little Rock is helping students graduate with the skills needed to positively contribute to a productive society.

That work is paying off, with UA Little Rock seeing a 10% increase in freshman retention from Fall 2022 to Spring 2023.

"Providing a variety of services to support students is critical in helping them succeed," said Kara Brown, assistant vice chancellor for student affairs. "No two students are exactly the same, so it's imperative that we have a wide variety of support services to meet any student where they are and provide them with the resources they need to continue their educational journey."

With support from the Donaghey Foundation and other donors, UA Little Rock has developed a comprehensive suite of services, all available at no additional cost to students:

Trojan Works is a program at UA Little Rock and is supported by the Donaghey Foundation. In addition to federal work study, the university provides institutional work study to provide financial assistance to a wider range of students.

Students taking part in the program have year-round employment opportunities, obtain real-world work experience, and gain leadership development.

Other program benefits include:

- Financial literacy training
- Professional development activities
- Networking opportunities

Additionally, national research shows that students who work on campus are more engaged in campus life and have higher retention and graduation rates than students who don't work on campus.

# UA Little Rock Protects Against Cyberattacks with \$1 Million Grant

UA Little Rock continues to lead in applied research aimed at protecting the region against cyberattacks and providing opportunities for students.

Earlier this year, the university expanded its Emerging Threat Information Sharing and Analysis Center to strengthen the fight against the escalating threat of cybersecurity attacks in the energy sector. This expansion is thanks to a \$1 million award from the Department of Energy's Office of Cyber Security, Energy Security, and Emergency Response and was endorsed by Sen. John Boozman.

"The Emerging Threat Information Sharing and Analysis Center will be an instrumental part of our national strategy to prevent cybersecurity breaches and attacks that have the potential to disrupt our lives," Sen. Boozman said. "I'm proud to support initiatives that strengthen the Natural State's role in combating cyberthreats and prepare and train our workforce to help protect our information and secure our critical networks."

ACTIVE APPLIED RESEARCH PROJECTS IN THE FIELD OF CYBERSECURITY

The new center will build a pipeline of student researchers to develop innovations to defend against cyber threats, with students from UA Little Rock and the University of Arkansas conducting the threat analysis.

"Everyone wins in these types of partnerships," said Dr. Albert Baker, head of the computer science department at UA Little Rock. "This center will allow our students to obtain relevant, real-world cyber experience that will give them a competitive advantage in their career field, and it allows UA Little Rock to continue supporting the needs of our community."

The center will also develop energy sector control system simulations for community members to train and test defensive measures to enhance protection against

cyberattacks. Local utilities and power system operators to benefit from the simulations include:

- Arkansas Public Power Utilities
- National Rural Electric Cooperative Association
- Entergy
- Midwest ISO
- Southwest Power Pool

Through applied research partnerships, UA Little Rock achieves its mission of applied research that benefits both the region and the students it serves.



# \$5 Million Grant to Assess Threats

UA Little Rock is researching better ways to analyze socio-cognitive security threats thanks to a substantial \$5 million grant from the U.S. Army Research Office (ARO). This grant is to develop innovative socio-computational capabilities that will allow for a more thorough assessment of emerging threats.

"The opportunity to develop interdisciplinary capabilities to mitigate emerging socio-cognitive threats can pay dividends for society by shoring up our defenses and strengthening community resilience. I am honored that the ARO trusts our team to lead this critical research in a global context and provide new learnings," said Dr. Nitin Agarwal, the principal investigator of the grant. Dr. Agarwal serves as the Maulden-Entergy Chair and Distinguished Professor of Information Science and founding director of the UA Little Rock COSMOS Research Center.

Traditional approaches to socio-cognitive threat analysis often focus on technical aspects, but the socio-computational approach Dr. Agarwal is developing goes beyond the technical. It seeks to explore the intersection of technology, human behavior, and socio-cognitive factors that contribute to the evolving landscape of socio-cognitive threats.

By developing advanced computational models that incorporate these factors, Dr. Agarwal's research could potentially uncover hidden patterns, motivations, and connections among threat actors (virtual or physical). This deeper understanding could lead to more effective strategies for threat detection, response, and prevention.

This kind of applied research exemplifies UA Little Rock's commitment to exploration that extends beyond academia to benefit the state, region, and the global community.

# Students Recognized for Research

A group of students from the University of Arkansas at Little Rock received the prestigious Gingles Award from the Arkansas Historical Association for their research on a 1930s controversial criminal case.

Led by Dr. John Kirk, the George W. Donaghey Distinguished Professor of History, the paper was co-written with students as part of a Seminar in the Public History capstone course that focuses on collaborative research for students who are earning a Master of Arts in public history.

The paper titled "From Lynching to Legal Lynching, Mob Justice to Courtroom Justice:

The Arkansas 'Scottsboro' Cases of James X. Caruthers and Clear 'Bubbles' Clayton, 1935-1939," will be published in the Arkansas Historical Quarterly.



"It is our goal to work with students to ensure that our capstone courses provide practical research experience for our students. Learning how to research, how to look for data, and how to articulate arguments in an organized manner will benefit these students in their chosen career," said Dr. Kirk. Station KLRE 90.5 first signed on the air back in 1973. Since that time the station, along with its sister station KUAR FM 89.1, have provided Arkansas with a news outlet and countless hours of radio programming.

While the station has been in existence for 50 years, there are several recent updates. One of the most significant changes is the addition of a new general manager, Jonathan Seaborn, who is passionate about the station's mission and moving the station forward.

"From music and news to community events and local stories, the station has been a staple in Arkansas, connecting people through the power of radio," said Jonathan Seaborn, general manager of UA Little Rock Public Radio.






UA Little Rock has a strong presence in downtown Little Rock. Here are a few places you can connect with us.
