### c. Catalog Description

This course will examine myths from around the world, exploring how archetypal themes and motifs reflect shared moral, philosophic, and aesthetic concerns. An emphasis will be placed on how these myths are transmitted across literary periods and how they remain relevant to contemporary life.

# d. How will your department ensure a level of consistency among sections of this course? Who will be responsible for this?

The English Department closely mentors all new faculty [members] to insure consistency among sections of required courses. New faculty [members] are given sample syllabi for the courses they will teach, including [Mythology] (English 2339), to use as a guide in crafting their own courses. Syllabi for [Mythology] are collected by the Chair and reviewed for consistency of learning objectives and assignments. Syllabi for [Mythology] are again reviewed by the departmental evaluation committee as part the annual faculty evaluation process, again with attention to consistency of learning objectives and assignments.
