No need to shop elsewhere; the bookstore will match prices with Amazon and local bookstores. Renting is usually less expensive, and you may be able to use financial aid to pay for your books.

WHAT IS FERPA?

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. § 1232g; 34 CFR Part 99) is a federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. The law applies to all schools that receive funds under an applicable program of the U.S. Department of Education.

FERPA gives parents certain rights with respect to their children's education records. These rights transfer to the student when he or she reaches the age of 18 or attends a school beyond high school. Students to whom the rights have transferred are "eligible students."

- » Parents or eligible students have the right to inspect and review the student's education records maintained by the school. Schools are not required to provide copies of records unless, for reasons such as great distance, it is impossible for parents or eligible students to review the records. Schools may charge a fee for copies.
- » Parents or eligible students have the right to request that a school correct records which they believe to be inaccurate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student has the right to a formal hearing. After the hearing, if the school still decides not to amend the record, the parent or eligible student has the right to place a statement with the record setting forth his or her view about the contested information.

Generally, schools must have written permission from the parent or eligible student in order to release any information from a student's education record. However, FERPA allows schools to disclose those records, without consent, to the following parties or under the following conditions (34 CFR § 99.31):

- » School officials with legitimate educational interest;
- » Other schools to which a student is transferring:
- » Specified officials for audit or evaluation purposes;
- » Appropriate parties in connection with financial aid to a student;
- » Organizations conducting certain studies for or on behalf of the school;
- » Accrediting organizations;
- » To comply with a judicial order or lawfully issued subpoena;
- » Appropriate officials in cases of health and safety emergencies; and
- » State and local authorities, within a juvenile justice system, pursuant to specific state law.

Schools may disclose, without consent, "directory" information such as a student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, honors and awards, and dates of attendance. However, schools must tell parents and eligible students about directory information and allow parents and eligible students a reasonable amount of time to request that the school not disclose directory information about them. Schools must notify parents and eligible students annually of their rights under FERPA. The actual means of notification (special letter, inclusion in a PTA bulletin, student handbook, or newspaper article) is left to the discretion of each school.

In order to provide a FERPA waiver to allow someone access to your academic records, follow the directions in the Navigate Boss video in the Navigating Boss and the Academic Calendar module in your Blackboard Pre-Advising Short Course.



Degree Types


» Associate degree: awarded for an undergraduate major generally lasting for two years of full-time study or at least 60 credit hours.

» Bachelor's degree: awarded for an undergraduate major generally lasting for four years of full-time study or at least 120 credit hours. This is the standard degree students receive when graduating from college.

» Certificate: not a degree, but a program of coursework in a specialty area that typically can be completed faster than a degree.

Understanding Your Bachelor's Degree

Your undergraduate bachelor's degree is earned upon successful completion of college credits in the following areas:



*Students must have 45 upper-level hours (3000-4000 level) and 30 hours at UA Little Rock to graduate. Students may be required to take college preparatory classes. Grades in these classes are not included in GPA calculations, and the hours do not count toward the minimum 120 hours to graduate.

How to Graduate in Four Years

It typically takes four years of college-level coursework to graduate with a bachelor's degree. Because a bachelor's degree usually contains 120 credit hours, we recommend you take 15 hours each fall and spring semester or take 12 hours each fall and spring semester and 6 hours during the summer!





Make sure you know and understand the following:

<u>Your Credit Hour Requirements for Scholarships:</u> Most scholarships require you to be enrolled in mandated credit hours at the beginning of the school year, even though some classes don't start until later in the semester.

What It Means To Be In Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP): You must complete 67% of the classes you attempt, and you must maintain a 2.0 GPA to keep your financial aid. A bachelor's degree is usually 120 credit hours. You will only have 180 hours of financial aid, which is 60 hours more, but very little room for errors (ualr.edu/financialaid/policies-procedures/sap).





MY COLLEGE MONEY

The tips below will help you manage your college money, ensure you meet your financial obligations, and help you remain financially successful at UA Little Rock.

Meet the office that can help guide you financially:

» The Bursar's Office will help walk you through your financial obligations. Bursar by definition: an officer (as of a college) in charge of funds. The office has has two divisions, Student Accounts and the Cashier's Office.

» When you register for a class, you become financially obligated to pay for the class. If you decide to drop a class (remove it from your schedule) or withdraw from the semester completely, make sure you adhere to the refund schedule set by the Bursar's Office. (ualr.edu/ bursar/refunds). To drop a class, see "Drop/Withdrawal from Class" (ualr.edu/records/get-registered)

Your bill delivery:

» You will receive an email letting you know a statement is ready to view in your Student Account. All emails will be sent to your UA Little Rock email address. Once in your student account, you can view your current and any past statement. OPEN YOUR BILL even if you think you know what your balance is.

Your student account:

- » To cover your balance, you must receive full Financial Aid, pay the total amount, or set up a payment plan, but do so by the deadline.
- » Refunds and adjustments are based solely on the date of withdrawal, regardless of whether you attended class.
- » If you don't pay, you will be declared delinquent subject to the penalties imposed by UA Little Rock for financial delinquency.
- » To set up a Deferred Payment Plan:
 - 1. From blackboard.ualr.edu Quick Links
 - 2. Select BOSS
 - 3. Select Personal Information tab, Select Student Services link; Student Accounts link; Payment Plans; and Click here to enroll in a payment plan.





REGISTERING FOR CLASSES WITH BOSS

Step 1: Log-in to BOSS at boss.ualr.edu.

Step 2: Once you have successfully logged into your BOSS account, choose the Student Services option from the menu.

Step 3: From there, choose the Registration option from the menu. This will bring you to the registration page, which will provide you with a registration-focused menu.

Step 4: From this page you will choose Register/Search for Classes. The system will ask you to specify which term you would like to register for. Once you choose the appropriate term you will be brought to the class search page.

Step 5: Choose your subject from the list provided and click the Course Search button.

Step 6: A list of courses should appear. You will need to click on the View Sections button next to the course that you are interested in registering for in order to view all of the available meeting times for that course.

Step 7: As you review the meeting times for your course, look to the left of each class and check for the following:

Checkbox: This means that you can register for this course.

C: Closed. This class is already full.

NR: No Registration. Registration is currently not available at this time.

SR: Student Registration. You may not register for any courses until restrictions are cleared. Choose the View Registration Status option from the bottom of the page to find out the status of your account.

Nothing: You are currently registered for this course. Please note, if you have errors you may use our Errors Tutorial by navigating to the Student Records website for assistance.

Step 8: You will need to click on the checkbox of the class(es) that you want to take. Then, go to the bottom of the page and click on the Register button.

Please Note: Depending on your screen size there may be information to the right of the page that you cannot see without scrolling. Some courses have both a lecture and a lab that must be taken during the same semester. To register for these types of courses, place a check next to both classes before you click on the Register button.



COLLEGE LINGO

Academic Advisor — Staff or faculty member designated to assist an individual throughout his or her college career as an academic resource person.

Academic Calendar — The Academic Calendar contains key dates including the registration deadlines, start and end dates of classes, holidays, and exam days.

Chancellor – The Chancellor is the executive officer of the university.

Classification — The number of credit hours earned in which you are categorized as a student; freshman (0-29 credit hours), sophomore (30-59 hours), junior (60-89 credit hours), or senior (90-120/124 credit hours).

Colleges — Colleges are often smaller entities that emphasize undergraduate education in a broad range of academic areas. There are three colleges at UA Little Rock.

CBHHS: College of Business, Health, and Human Services.

CHASSE: College of Humanities, Arts, Social Sciences, and Education.

DCSTEM: Donaghey College of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics.

Course Number — A four-digit numbering system is used to designate each course at UA Little Rock. The first digit identifies the level of the course: 1 for freshman, 2 for sophomore, 3 for junior, 4 for senior, 5 and above for graduate-level courses. The second digit is the number of credit hours.

Credit Hours — This is the standard unit of measurement for university-level work applicable toward a degree. The term "credit hour" is often shortened to "hours."

Department, College, or School — A department is the basic administrative unit at UA Little Rock. It consists of a group of faculty members and their chairperson. Departments with related interests are organized into colleges. Academic administrative units without departments are called schools.

FERPA — The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) allows you certain rights with regard to your educational records as a student. For complete information, visit the UA Little Rock Student Handbook.

Good Standing — A student is considered in good standing at the end of a semester if their cumulative GPA is 2.00 or above. If a student is put on probation, they will need to raise their GPA above 2.00 to return to good standing.

Grade Point Average (GPA) — GPA is the indicator of a student's academic performance, with a 4.0 being the highest level of performance. Quality Points are assigned to each letter grade received (e.g., A = 4; B = 3; C = 2; D = 1; F = 0). Some developmental course grades are excluded. The GPA is the standard measure for retention and graduation requirements. Your semester grade report will show both the semester and the cumulative GPA.

Graduation Application — This document should be filed with Records and Registration once you have registered for your final semester of coursework. You file this in your BOSS Account.

Important Dates Calendar — A calendar is maintained by the Office of Records and Registration that contains deadlines for financial aid and a schedule for registration and withdrawal. It is available to view online at https://ualr.edu/records/calendar/ and in the registration guides for each term.



Prerequisite — Course required to have been successfully completed prior to enrollment in a more advanced related course. If a course has a prerequisite, it is listed in the course description.

Privacy Act (also called FERPA) — The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) establishes the confidentiality of student records and the conditions under which students and others may review a student's educational records. These records, including grades, are confidential and may only be released to the individual student to whom they pertain. For more information, consult the University Student Handbook or the Dean of Student's office.

Provost — A provost is the chief academic officer of a university. They directly oversee the colleges, as well as major academic initiatives and the faculty. Dr. Ann Bain is currently UA Little Rock's provost.

Withdrawal — The letter "W" is recorded when a student voluntarily and officially drops a specific course or all enrolled courses at the university within a specified time period. If you never attend classes for which you are registered, you remain legally liable for tuition and fees unless you follow official withdrawal procedures. In order to withdraw, you must obtain an official form from the Office of Records and Registration. For deadlines please refer to the academic calendar.

Q: Where do I find the form for my records request?

Q: Where can I see the Academic Calendar?

A: View the academic calendar at *ualr.edu/records/calendar*. Once you're there, you can view the start and end dates for terms, as well as important semester dates – even the schedule for final exams. Check out the calendar if you have any questions about deadlines.

Q: Is there a hold that can keep me from dropping classes? Why can't I drop a course?

A: Once late registration is over for the term, you may notice you are no longer allowed to adjust your schedule on your own – this is normal. You'll need to fill out a drop/withdrawal form, at

ualr.edu/records/forms under "After Classes Begin." You will sign in with your NetID. You can also find the form in BOSS, as "Drop/Withdrawal Request Form."
